



Primary PE and Sport Premium Overview 2016 2017

At Allerton C of E Primary School we believe PE & Sport plays an important role in making our vision statement a reality for every pupil, with the potential to change young people's lives for the better.

We have welcomed the Government's announcement to continue to provide additional funding to 2020 to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. We are committed to using this resource in developing high quality PE lessons, alongside greater opportunities for sporting competitions and clubs for all our young people.

Sport Premium Grant

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1-6. All schools with 17 or more primary aged pupils will receive a lump sum of £8,000 plus a premium of £5 per pupil. (£5550 March 2015)

What does the Sport Premium mean for our School?

'Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and Sport they offer.' Dfe Oct 15

Vision: ALL pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge, skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy, active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport.

Objective: To achieve **self-sustaining** improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools against 5 key indicators:

1. the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. increased participation in competitive sport
